The finite, or main form of the verb, has a subject, a tense and can be a singular or plural.

For example:

Mum says hello.

Stella was in the water.

Infinitive verbs are the verb with to in front of them, for example to go.

The infinitive verb without *to* is called the base verb.

You use the base verb after a modal verb.

For example:

I will write a novel one day.

Dad *could* not pull Stella out of the water.

A modal verb is an auxiliary verb that shows necessity or possibility (can, could, shall, should, must, may, might, will, would).

You use the infinitive form with to after some verbs.

For example:

Mum was trying to bring the boat close to Stella.

You can begin some sentences with an infinitive.

For example:

To become a good writer, you need to write every day.
