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Subject and Predicate

Sentences can be divided into a subject and a predicate.

The subject says who or what is doing the action in the sentence.

The predicate is the rest of the sentence and says what is done. It always contains a verb.

To find the subject, first find the verb, then ask who or what did the verb. For example

The woman (subject) ate the chocolate(predicate).

Who ate the chocolate? The woman.

The predicate can be divided into verb and object.

For example;

Ate (verb) the chocolate (object)

The object tells us who or what is being acted upon.

To find the object, ask who or what after the verb.

For example:

The woman ate what? the chocolate

Not all predicates contain an object. For example;

John sang quietly. The word quietly is an adverb. It tells us the manner in which John sang.

It does not tell us what he sang, so there is no object in this sentence.
