Remember the following:

'f' changes to a 'w'

We have to remember to follow the vowel rules. For example:

One, single vowel: $l\underline{a}f$ – lawwer (The 'f' changes to a 'w' and we have a single, short vowel so we have to double the consonant. In this case the consonant is a 'w' and that is why the 'w' is doubled.)

Two different vowels: lief – liewer (The 'f' changes to a 'w' and because there are two, different vowels we only add -er)

Also remember:

If the word ends on a 'd' then the 'd' falls away and we add -er.

*Once again you have to look at the vowel rules!!!

For example: If the word has two different vowels then I know that nothing happens to my vowels and that the 'd' falls away and I only add -er.

*If the word has twin vowels I already know that one of the twin vowels will run away. I also know that the 'd' falls away before adding the -er.

You would've noted that there are some other rules as well where we have to look at what letter(s) the word ends on.

For example:

Words ending on 'lik' = Only add -er *(For example: ou<u>lik</u> – ouliker)* Words ending on 'ig' = Only add -er *(For example: vinn<u>ig</u> – vinniger)* Words ending on 'r' = Only add -der *(For example: duu<u>r</u> – duurder) (*Ignore the vowels! Meaning; even if there are twin vowels one will NOT run away)*
